

Each entry includes a headword, grammatical information, and one or more English definitions. Where appropriate, alternate spellings of headwords, usage labels, phrase and sentence examples, loan source information, and cross references to related words are also provided. An English to Ponapean finder list containing approximately 4,200 entries is also included to enable the user to locate key English words used in the definitions in the Ponapean entries. Designed to serve as a reference volume for native speakers of the language, particularly for Ponapean educators working in bilingual programs, this work will also be of value to English speaking students of Ponapean and to scholars of other Pacific languages and cultures. This dictionary was prepared as a companion volume to the Ponapean Reference Grammar by the same authors.

Marshallese Reference Grammar Byron W. Bender, Alfred Capelle, Louise Pagotto, 2016-07-31 This reference grammar covers the phonology, morphology, and syntax of the language of the Republic of the Marshall Islands. It is the result of a long and sustained effort, inexorably entwined with that of the Marshallese English Dictionary published in 1976. Following a general introduction that situates the islands and their people in the cultural and historical context of Micronesia, chapters examine the sound system of Marshallese and survey the more important characteristics of the two major parts of speech: nouns and verbs. A section on the nine major verb classes is included. Special attention is given to a complex set of directional adverbs used in predicates of all sorts and from which back and forth verbs are formed. The final chapter analyzes Marshallese sentences, focusing on the sentences themselves and on considerations that apply at the sentence level. The identification of five case relations and of verbs that are impersonal provides explanations for seeming problems of grammatical agreement. The grammar avoids technical terminology, especially in the early chapters, and is aimed at educated laypersons, teachers, and college students who either speak the language or are motivated to learn it. It is rich with examples for each topic, including words exemplifying the contrasts in the sound system and sentences that highlight special points and intricacies in constructions such as cleft sentences and the phenomenon known as switch reference.

Act-based Conceptions of Propositional Content Friederike Moltmann, Markus Textor, 2017 The notion of a propositional content plays a central role in contemporary philosophy of language Propositional content makes up both the meaning of sentences and the content of propositional attitudes such as belief One particular view about propositional content has been dominant in analytic philosophy namely the Fregean conception of propositions as abstract mind independent objects that come with truth conditions But propositions in this sense raise a range of issues which have become a center of debate in current philosophy of language In particular how should propositions as abstract objects be understood and how can they represent things and be true or false A number of philosophers in contemporary analytic philosophy as well as in early analytic philosophy and phenomenology have approached the notion of a propositional content in a different way not by starting out with an abstract truth bearer but by focusing on cognitive acts of agents such as acts of judging It is in terms of such acts that the notion of a propositional content on their view should be understood The act based perspective historically goes back to the work of Central European philosophers in particular that of Husserl Twardowski Meinong and Reinach However their work has been unduly neglected and is in fact largely inaccessible to contemporary analytic philosophers The volume presents a central selection of work of these philosophers that bear on an act based conception of philosophical content some of which in new translations one paper by Reinach some of which published in English for the very first time two papers by Twardowski In addition the volume presents new work by leading contemporary philosophers of language pursuing or discussing an act based conception of propositional content Moreover the book contains a crosslinguistic study of nominalizations for actions and products a distinction that plays a central role in the philosophy of language of Twardowski

would be improbable or even exceptional in terms of the typology of linguistic change This book revisits central issues of the comparative grammar of Austronesian languages from this angle such as the history of person markers particularly in the 2nd person the genesis of the so called focus verbal voice system and the typology of sentence structures There is nothing in these domains that supports the supposition that Proto Austronesian was very similar to the Formosan languages
