North American Indian Art David W Penney, 2004-06-01 A splendidly illustrated introduction to the rich history of Native American art distinguished by its broad coverage and nuanced discussion This timely new book surveys the artistic traditions of indigenous North America from those of ancient cultures such as Adena Hopewell Mississippian and Anasazi to the work of modern artists like Earnest Spybuck Fred Kabotie Dick West T C Cannon and Gerald McMaster The text is organized geographically and draws upon the testimonies of oral tradition Native American history and the latest research in North American archaeology Recent art historical scholarship has helped restore to a large degree some understanding of the identities and cultural roles of Native American artists and the social contexts of the objects they created Native American art is often discussed simply as a cultural production rather than the work of individual artists who made objects to fulfill social and cultural purposes this book focuses as much as possible on the artists themselves their cultural identities and the objects they made even when the names of the individual artists remain unrecoverable But this is not a book of artists biographies It seeks to inform a general readership about the history of Native American art with a lively narrative full of historical incident and illustrated with provocative and superlative works of art It explores the tension between artistic continuities spanning thousands of years and the startlingly fresh innovations that resulted from specific historical circumstances The narrative weaves together so called traditional arts tourist arts and Native American art of today by taking the point of view of their particular and local histories the artists their communities and audiences Among the many cultures included are Arapaho Athapascan Cherokee Cheyenne Chumash Hopi Hupa Karok Inuit Iroquois Kwakiutl Lakota Miwok Navajo Ojibwa Pomo Tlingit Tsimshian Uypik and Zuni *Native American Art & Culture* Brendan

here are cartoon figures in throbbing neon colors decorated grocery bags messages to America on the Spectacolor billboard in Times Square delicate abstractions and cubist images work that ranges from monotype and photography to mixed media and clay from humor and biting commentary to quiet introspection I Stand in the Center of Good the first book of its kind offers a forum for seventeen contemporary Native American artists to speak about the development of their art their creative processes how they define their art and how it relates to their Indianness The interviews are handsomely illustrated with works by the artists who include Rick Glazer Danay Shan Goshorn Hachivi Edgar Heap of Birds Rick Hill G Peter Jemison Michael Kabotie Frank LaPena Carm Little Turtle Linda Lomahaftewa George Longfish Mario Martinez Nora Naranjo Morse Jaune Quick to See Smith Susan Stewart Frank Tuttle Kay WalkingStick and Emmi Whitehorse *A New Deal for Native Art* Jennifer McLerran, 2022-08-16 As the Great Depression touched every corner of America the New Deal promoted indigenous arts and crafts as a means of bootstrapping Native American peoples But New Deal administrators romanticization of indigenous artists predisposed them to favor pre industrial forms rather than art that responded to contemporary markets In *A New Deal for Native Art* Jennifer McLerran reveals how positioning the native artist as a pre modern Other served the goals of New Deal programs and how this sometimes worked at cross purposes with promoting native self sufficiency She describes federal policies of the 1930s and early 1940s that sought to generate an upscale market for Native American arts and crafts And by unraveling the complex ways in which commodification was negotiated and the roles that producers consumers and New Deal administrators played in that process she sheds new light on native art s commodity status and the artist s position as colonial subject In this first book to address the ways in which New Deal Indian policy specifically advanced commodification and colonization McLerran reviews its multi pronged effort to improve the market for Indian art through the Indian Arts and Crafts Board arts and crafts cooperatives murals museum exhibits and Civilian Conservation Corps projects Presenting nationwide case studies that demonstrate transcultural dynamics of production and reception she argues for viewing Indian art as a commodity as part of the national economy and as part of national political trends and reform efforts McLerran marks the contributions of key individuals from John Collier and Rene d Harnoncourt to Navajo artist Gerald Nailor whose mural in the Navajo Nation Council House conveyed distinctly different messages to outsiders and tribal members Featuring dozens of illustrations *A New Deal for Native Art* offers a new look at the complexities of folk art revivals as it opens a new window on the Indian New Deal *Not Native American Art* Janet Catherine Berlo, 2023-09-26 Explores the making and meaning of so called Native American art The faking of Native American art objects has proliferated as their commercial value has increased but even a century ago experts were warning that the faking of objects ranging from catlinite pipes to Chumash sculpture was rampant Through a series of historical and contemporary case studies Janet Catherine Berlo engages with troubling and sometimes confusing categories of inauthenticity Based on decades of research as well as interviews with curators collectors restorers replica makers reenactors and Native artists and cultural specialists

Not Native American Art examines the historical and social contexts within which people make replicas and fakes or even invent new objects that then become traditional. Berlo follows the unexpected trajectories of such objects including Northwest Coast carvings, Navajo rugs made in Mexico, Zuni mask replicas, Lakota style quillwork, and Mimbres bowl forgeries. With engaging anecdotes, the book offers a rich and nuanced understanding of a surprisingly wide range of practices that makers have used to produce objects that are not Native American art.

In his fourth volume exploring race and culture in the New West, Denzin zeroes in on painting movements in Taos, New Mexico, over the past century.
